This event is sponsored jointly by the Williamsburg Chapter of the DAR and the Jamestown Yorktown Foundation. Guest speaker, Thomas Jefferson i.e. Bill Parker, reminded our new citizens that our constitutional government depends upon an involved citizenry.

Speaking of rooms and rates, there are two types:
Deluxe Rivue Rooms (either two Queen or one King bed)
for \$125.00 per night plus taxes;
Executive Suites (two Queen beds) for \$145.00 per night plus taxes.

Now some miscellaneous information:

The closet in the regular rooms are like a normal hotel room about 36" of hanging space. The closet in a Executive Suite are about 48" long. Wifi is **free** in the room if you are listed as SAR. Mini-refrigerators are available in the Executive Suites. There are no refrigerators in the Deluxe Rivue Rooms. Parking is \$10.00 per day. This is a price reduction.

Battle of Guilford County Courthouse

On Saturday, March 14, I was privileged to represent the Williamsburg Chapter at the 234th Anniversary of the Battle of Guilford County Courthouse near Greensboro, North Carolina. Unfortunately, the heady rain precluded all outdoor activities, so the ceremony was held indoors.

You may remember that in January and February, 1781, General Nathaniel Greene led his American Army in a race with British General Cornwallis northward through North Carolina in order to be first in the race to cross the Dan River (near South Boston, Virginia). Greene won this desperate race and gained time to re-supply and enlarge his Army. Cornwallis could not cross the Dan (because Greene had captured or destroyed all of the ferry boats), and turned back to re-enter North Carolina.



In March, 1781, Greene, with his Army restored and enlarged, re-crossed the Dan and headed into North Carolina. The two forces met at Guilford County Courthouse. Cornwallis had to deal with several problems, including the fact that his light infantry force had been killed, wounded or captured at Cowpens by General Morgan's American forces. Though outnumbered, Cornwallis won the day but at a terrible cost. British antiwar politician, Charles Fox, commented after the battle: "Another such victory would ruin the British Army".

Greene, with a force of 4,500 men (including militia) reported approximately 70 killed, 185 wounded and 1,046 missing (the militia went home)


After the battle Greene continued south into South Carolina to dislodge the British. Cornwallis went on to Wilmington, North Carolina to re-supply his troops, and then moved into Virginia and, ultimately, to Yorktown.

The Commemoration of the 264th Anniversary of President James Madison was held on Monday, March 16 at Montpelier, the former Madison family home. I represented our Chapter at the celebration on a magnificent

day.



A detachment of Marines from Quantico Marine Base, including Colonel David Maxwell, Base Commander, led the ceremony. There were a large number of wreaths presented at the Madison family cemetery, including wreaths from the State of Virginia SAR, six Virginia SAR chapters, and the War of 1812 Virginia State Society.



After the ceremony, I was able to take a tour of the restored mansion, Members of the duPont family paid for the restoration. The tour was led by a very knowledgeable guide. James Madison was available to greet visitors. Montpelier is approximately two hours from Williamsburg.

Lafayette's Hermione Voyage 2015



The Hermione, the ship that reunited Lafayette and Washington and sealed our freedom sails again for America

Twenty years ago a small group met together and discussed the idea of reconstructing an exact replica of the Hermione. Now it is almost completed - originally one of the most authentically built Tall Ships ever. Meantime, the idea grew that the Hermione should sail to the USA - bringing to life the voyage made by Lafayette in 1780 and re-affirming the historic relationship between the United States and France. The Hermione's first voyage will take her across the Atlantic.

The itinerary for the Hermione Voyage 2015 will take the Hermione to Yorktown, Virginia (June 5th-7th2015), where she took part in the blockade that led to the surrender of Lord Cornwallis and his army. It will then move up the coast, close to Washington DC at Mt. Vernon and Alexandria, then stop in Annapolis, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Greenport, Newport, Boston, Castine, and then Lunenburg/Halifax, Nova Scotia before heading back home to France.

Compatriots,



We likely will have participation by the Governor, the Premier and the U.S. Consul General. But there will also be time for participants to enjoy the stunning beauty of Bermuda, from its pink sand beaches to its world-class golf courses!

Our headquarters is the Fairmont Southampton, one of the finest hotels on Bermuda -- and just a short walk from the world-famous Horseshoe Bay Beach.

This trip is open to SAR, DAR and CAR members and their families. All of the special events will be joint SAR-DAR-CAR events with official participation from all three organizations.



I am writing to ask that you pass along to your officers and members the following information regarding the activities in April to celebrate President James Monroe's 257th birthday.

This year, the actual birthday (April 28) ceremonies for President Monroe in Richmond (at Hollywood Cemetery) and in Westmoreland County (at the Monroe birthplace farm south of Colonial Beach) will occur on a different schedule, but we hope you can attend both events.

Westmoreland County Ceremony - Saturday, April 25

Starting at 10:00 a.m., at the Birthplace, the 257th anniversary ceremonies are expected to include local and state elected officials and federal officials. The formal ceremony will commence at 10:30 a.m. Lunch will be provided afterward at the Moose Lodge nearby. Come to see the latest exhibits at the Visitor Center and learn the latest update on the Foundation's plans to rebuild the Birthplace house. There will be an opportunity for lineage societies to present wreaths. See www.monroefoundation.org for the Birthplace location.

Hollywood Cemetery Ceremony - Tuesday, April 28

This year our annual wreath-laying ceremony at President Monroe's tomb in Hollywood Cemetery in Richmond will be at 11:00 a.m. (subject to any changes by the Army, which conducts the ceremony). This is an impressive ceremony, with a speech on behalf of the President delivered by an Army general, a proclamation by the Governor, the Fort Lee color guard and band, and wreaths presented by the President, our Foundation, and various lineage societies.

We invite your participation and hope that attendance and participation at the annual Monroe birthday events will become a regular goal for all Virginia lineage societies which seek to honor our history.
