Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. I welve signers' houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

#### Hanging Around Jamestowne

The name Nathaniel Bacon is heard frequently as tour guides relate the history of Jamestown and early Virginia. His role in the development of Great Britain's new colony, portrayed as a villain and leader of what some call the First Revolutionary War, has been a target of many historians with varied conclusions.

A hundred years before the conflict that resulted in a free and independent nation of united states, Bacon, and a band of like-minded colonists, challenged the rule of Royal Governor William Berkeley. The complicated sequence of events, both before and after Bacon's death by natural causes, is best recorded in Martha McCartney's book, James City County, Keystone of the Commonwealth, pages 113-126.

Bacon was a rebel at odds with government and especially a thorn in the side of the governor. On 19 September 1676 he chased Governor Berkeley from his seat of power, Jamestown, which he burned to the ground. His men then plundered Berkeley's home at Green Spring. On October 26 Bacon died and his successor was unable to control breakaway rebel groups that continued to spread violence.

Berkeley retaliated, thanks in part to British troops that arrived from England in January, 1677. Soon the guerilla leaders were swept up and appeared in court; some received minor punishments, nine were sentenced to death.

One such leader was named William Scarborough, member of a family of wealthy landowners of the Eastern Shore and Maryland, and from whom one of Williamsburg's SAR Chapter member descends.

William was among a separate group of prisoners awaiting legal action. Across the Atlantic, King Charles appointed Royal Commissioners to investigate the grievances that led to the rebellion, and issued pardons to the group awaiting trial.

In defiance of his Majesty, Governor Berkeley concluded the legal proceedings which led to death sentences. And he ordered Scarborough and the others to be hung by the neck until dead. Berkeley was recalled to London and died shortly thereafter.

Some speculate that Sir Charles Scarborough, Royal Physician to the King, may have exerted influence in the King's decision to pardon the men.

History has yet to identify the location of the hanging; no evidence of gallows has been uncovered at the Jamestown archaeological dig site. Yet!

John Moseley, Williamsburg Chapter member, descends from William Scarborough through Revolutionary War ancestor, Major James Scarborough, and has other identified Patriots from the Surry County area.
